As a Board member or volunteer:

Food Pantry Report September 2022

In September, the Food Pantry served 69 households and 205 individuals. This is down slightly, by 3 families, from August, 2022.

Jean and Bruce Larson will attend a MANNA conference for the SMCC Food Pantry held September 21st. Ilsa Myers attended an online meeting for the SMCC Food Pantry.

Our food pantry may begin to have access to around 75 lbs of frozen food from Dollar General. This is being facilitated by a program at MANNA which connects individual retail outlets with food pantries to pick-up food at the store that would otherwise be wasted. We will know more in the next couple of months.

# **Youth Report**

September, 2022

Two parents, Tina Gustavvson and Stacey Peek, will begin this month to open SMCC from 3:30 to 5:30 on Thursdays for older youth and their parent. At present, the youth participating are primarily ages 9 years to 13 years.

The Dollar General Summer Literacy grant program, Diving Into Reading, was a success. The program served children from 4 years to 12 years. The children completed reading at home and at SMCC and divided into three groups for age appropriate literacy activities. Twenty three children participated in the program.

A local counselor, Linda Harrison, is volunteering once a month to work with parents on techniques for focus and stress reduction with children. The dates are 9/19, 10/24, 11/TBD, 12/TBD and open to the full community of parents whether they are participating in Monday Playgroup or not.

Science Club will be held every other Tuesday, 10:30 to 1, this Fall for 4 years to 12 years: 9/13, 9/27, 10/11, 10/25, 11/8. Parents and volunteers will plan learning programming for different ages.

The Youth program received \$500 in supplies from Publix via United Way.
