Forestry Coalition Written Report

submitted by Terri Wells, as attending Community Member

The first Forestry Coalition meeting on August 1, 2019 was well attended, with good community input, and several useful government agencies participating. Building these relationships has valuable potential for our community. Here are a few highlights:

40+ individuals attended

Public agencies= 5 (NC Forest Service, Buncombe County Soil & Water, Madison County Soil & Water, NC Wildlife Resources Commission, Buncombe County Planning)

Nonprofit organizations= 5 (Forest Stewards Guild, EcoForesters, SAHC, Mountain True, Long Branch Environmental Education Center) Private businesses/corporations= 2 (Wildwood Consulting, Evergreen Packaging)

Goals accomplished at first mtg

- 1. Identification of themes that participants have in common- why do people value the forests in Sandy Mush?
 - a. Major themes: sense of place, value ecosystem services, challenges of invasive plants, working together
- 2. Sharing hopes and fears about the Sandy Mush Forest Restoration Coalition

Fears

- No Snacks!
- Not being able to sustain interest and drive long-term

• Long-term and widespread use of herbicides - wildlife, landscape, watersheds

- Not being able to follow through
- How it will be paid for
- Grant money actually used for work on the ground with landowners

Cost-share not possible for some landowners-still a cost

Hopes

- Get people that aren't here interested.
- Hearing from the community
- Collaboration
- Learn how to manage the forest
- · Community takes the time to learn
- · Learning culture
- Develop workshops free for landowners, community sharing knowledge
 - Realistic expectations about invasives control, not eradication

SMCC Food Pantry Report

At the July Food Pantry we served 58 households, 171 individuals and had 126 volunteer hours.

We were encouraged by MANNA to apply for the Western NC Community Foundation "People in Need" Grant to finish the construction of the downstairs kitchen, get other items needed to finish the room and carts for food storage and for the chairs and tables. We had submitted a Letter of Intent and were just informed that we can now apply for the Grant. The Grant needs to be submitted by Sept 6th.

John Loyd and Jean Larson have volunteered to head up our Nutrition Works cooking demonstrations. They choose a recipe to prepare using fresh produce that we have on the day of the Pantry and also provide the printed recipe for people to take home with them. We usually do not know what produce will be available until last minute and they have both risen to the challenge! We had Egg Frittata in July and Spaghetti Squash Hash in August and both were well received. Who knew spaghetti squash could be so good? We can't thank them enough for taking on this task.
